



Discernment for Ordained Ministry In the Diocese of Hereford



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Christians are called to serve God in all sorts of ways, in their work and voluntary activities, in their relationships and through the church.

Within the variety of Christian callings, since early times the Church has set aside some of its members by ordination, to be fully dedicated to ministry and to bear various responsibilities. In the Church of England, the vast majority of those ordained are priests.

If you, or someone you know, feels they may be called to ordained ministry, this should first always be discussed with the relevant parish priest. They may then contact the Diocesan Director of Vocations & Ordinands (DDVO), who meets with prospective candidates and oversees the process. Candidates should be prepared for a long testing process of discernment, over at least a year, accepting that all parts of their lives are potentially relevant areas to be explored and that the outcome may not be what they hope.

What is the Process of Discernment?

In the Church of England, the discernment process is shared between the local diocese and the national church and is based on the Qualities for Discernment:

- Love of God
- Call to Ministry
- Love of People
- Wisdom
- Fruitfulness
- Potential

Broadly, there are usually the following phases:

1) Diocesan Discernment

The DDVO will meet with all candidates initially, after which they may continue to meet with the DDVO or with one of the Assistant Diocesan Directors of Ordinands (ADDOs).

Confidentiality is held by the whole discernment process and not individuals within it, so information may be shared with others who are part of the discernment process locally and nationally.

During this phase the candidate will be asked for lots of information about themselves and may be encouraged to do some reading or other activities such as visiting different kinds of churches or meeting with people in ministry.

As things progress, there will be more searching questions and Safeguarding checks as well as a psychotherapy assessment. The candidate will also need to have read and considered some key church documents.


2) National Discernment: Stage 1


This consists of a day of online conversations with national discernment advisers, called Carousel Conversations. These usually happen between November and February and focus on the 'doing' and 'knowing' aspects of the Qualities Grid.



3) National Discernment: Stage 2

This involves a two day residential/non-residential gathering with national vocations advisers, including two in-depth 75 minute interviews and a group exercise. These usually take place between March and July and focus on the 'being' and 'growing' aspects of the Qualities Grid.





4) Bishop's Decision

Following receipt of the report, the Bishop will make a decision. The candidate may proceed to training or have to gain experience of some kind before starting training. If a candidate is not recommended for training, then appropriate support will be given.
